SPRING

...as the soil warms the sap rises, coaxing new growth from the erstwhile dormant vine. Bud-break occurs in different varieties at different times and is followed by the emergence of foliage and shoots, some of which have tiny green clusters. Delicate flowers appear from each bud and, weather permitting, are pollinated and fertilised.

Weather is all-important during this critical season; new growth is highly susceptible to the dangers of frost, and temperatures of -1 degree celsius are cold enough to irreparably damage the years harvest, and potentially the following one too.

Having survived the trials of youth, the vine prepares to unfurl its leaves in order to start the conversion of light into the sugars that will eventually swell the now-embryonic berries.

WINE IS GOOD FOR YOU

The polyphenols found in wine are powerful antioxidants that partially mitigate the free radicals that are constantly causing cellular damage within your body.

Resveratrol can raise the level of good cholesterol in your system while preventing clotting. The alcohol in wine can further improve the balance between LDL and HDL cholesterol, reducing the risk of heart disease. Also, a French study has shown that moderate wine drinkers are less likely to develop dementia than tee-totalers. Reassuring.

SOIL

Soils for vine cultivation need to be relatively infertile - some of the greatest terroirs in the world are composed of soil so poor that not much other than wine production is sustainable (Oporto, Jerez, Mosel, & Chateauneuf-du-Pape to name but a few).

They need to contain enough mineral elements and nutrients to sustain healthy vine growth, but soils that are too fertile promote vigour leading to valuable resources being diverted from the fruit to the canopy.

Oak fermentation and / or maturation bestow body, flavour, and complexity on a wine. Different types of oak impart different characters. The faster-growing, wider-grained American oak is more highly aromatic, imparting a strong coconut character, while the use of French oak generally results in a higher level of finer-grained tannins, and graphite / vanilla and sweet spice aromas.

The use of oak adds considerably to the cost of production of a wine, with new 225 litre barrels fetching \$1400 or so.

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SPANISH WHITES

Massive investment in Spain's wine industry over the past twenty to thirty years has resulted in a massive upswing in Spanish wine quality - especially its whites. Modern winemaking equipment and techniques, high average vine age, low-cropping due to an arid climate, centuries of winemaking tradition and a resurgence in the cultivation of indigenous grape varieties all result in the production of an array of interesting and excellent value for money wines.

VINE AGE AND WINE QUALITY

In general, older vines produce lower yields of better quality fruit with higher levels of concentration. A vine will not produce fruit suitable for commercial purposes until it reaches between three and five years of age, with its best years between twenty and fifty, after which yields for most varieties drop so low as to make them economically unviable.

Different vine varieties produce grapes of differing sizes, skin thickness, and hue, all of which impact greatly on the taste and quality of the resulting wine. Most of the classic grape varieties tend to have smaller berries, resulting in greater skin-to-pulp ratio and a more concentrated flavour. Grape skins contain tannins, colouring agents, and a significant amount of flavour compounds. Varieties that boast small berries with thick skins, such as Cabernet Sauvignon, generally produce deeper-coloured, more powerfully aromatic and tannic wines, than larger-berried, thinner-skinned varieties such as Merlot.



Bordeaux - Medoc and Graves

1989 ****

An enormous (and exceptionally early) vintage produced a good number of rich and fleshy wines. Some lack sufficient acidity for longer term keeping. Margaux performed relatively poorly. The best wines are from St Estephe, Pauillac and St. Julien. (D)

1995 ****

A good vintage across Bordeaux, with a number of well-structured wines. (D)

2000 *****

Possibly the finest vintage since 1990......bear in mind that many less well known properties, including crus bourgeois, enjoyed the same excellent conditions at harvest and made superb wines. (D)

2001 ****

The overall quality of the reds was better than 1999 but not so great as 2000. Quantity was down. For dry whites conditions were ideal. Wines are powerfully aromatic with remarkably fresh, fruity flavours sustained by excellent acidity. (D)

2002 ****

Crisp fruity whites and well-structured, stylish reds with aging potential. (D)

2004 ****

Whites of good fruit concentration and refreshing acidity; classic reds with some aging potential (D)

2006 ****

Potentially hard and tough but good for people who like their wines tannic. Doesn't have the flesh or ripeness of 2005 or 2003 but is better than 1999. May turn out to be a more classic vintage like 1996 but with less ripeness. (D)

Rioja

2004 *****

Wines with high alcohol and concentrated colour and aromas ideal for ageing. (D)

2005 *****

The grapes arrived in excellent health with analytical parameters which correspond to an extraordinary vintage. (D)

2009 ****

Quality is generally high, but high yields meant some green harvesting. A 'useful' vintage, probably for drinking relatively early. (D)

Burgundy - Red

2001 ****

Intensely fruity wine with clear terroir distinction. (D)

2002 ****

Fine tannins, ripe fruit and excellent balance. (D)

2003 ****

Superb, expressive wine from the best producers and best appellations certainly worthy of cellaring. (D)

2007 ***

Fragrant wines with light tannins and fresh, accessible fruit, though styles vary hugely as a result of the erratic, labour-intensive vintage. (D)

2009 9/10

One is tempted to want to play down the hype surrounding the 2009 Burgundy wine vintage but it is hard to do so. While this is not 2005, a vintage of unparalleled density and a firm tannic structure for exceptionally long ageing, 2009 ranks among the very best Burgundy wine vintages of recent times. (BBR)

2010 9/10

The red Burgundy wines are built around a triangle of fruit, tannins and acidity this year, whereas some Burgundian vintages lean more towards the tannic or the acidic. These are beautifully balanced wines in 2010, very classical, with much more red fruit than black, notably cherries and raspberries, and very few green notes. (BBR)

Burgundy - White

2007 ****

A classic vintage with searingly fresh acidity, terroir-driven fruit and good potential to age. (D)

2008 ***

Difficult, low-yielding vintage of varied quality. Intriguing combination of richness and fresh acidity due to late sunshine and cold breezes. (D)

2009 9/10

Contrary to initial expectations, many of the white Burgundy wines in 2009 are absolutely stunning. They began to show their true qualities only after the summer, when a mineral backbone appeared in support of the graceful, ripe fruit. (BBR)

2010 **8/10**

It is mostly a very fine vintage for white burgundy wines, though the storm on 12th September has affected some but not all of the southern Côte de Beaune wines. (BBR)

Northern Rhone

1998 ****

Northern Rhônes are full, punchy and well developed. Reds were very good, with fine concentration and structure. (D)

1999 ****

Quality overall is very good, though not as exceptional as 1998. The wines seem well balanced and structured, and could be exceptional in Condrieu and Côte Rotie. (D)

2004 ***

Well-balanced wines with good purity of fruit in Southern Rhône. Less consistency from Northern Rhône, ranging from fresh and rounded to crisp and green. For early drinking. (D)

2005 *****

A benchmark vintage for Syrah in the Northern Rhône. The best wines have a firm clear fruit core overlaid with smooth black fruit and peppery tannins. Hermitage and Cornas will be long-lived thanks to their balance and sound acidity. (D)

2007 *****

Hermitage and Côte-Rôtie are highlights of the Northern Rhône - fresh, forward Syrah with good colour and well-structured, even silky, tannins. (D)

Southern Rhone

1999 ****

Quality overall is very good, though not as exceptional as 1998. (D)

2005 *****

In the Southern Rhône, prestige Châteauneuf-du-Pape are very good to excellent, with focused fruit and perfect acidity. Tannins are rounded and there is enough matter to handle elevated alcohol levels (often 15%+). (D)

2009 8/10

In short, a very fine year, somewhere stylistically between 2007 and 2005 and certainly providing some superb wines to keep in the long-term. (BBR)

Alsace

2007 Grade A

Wine lovers seeking the elegance and balance that typifies classic Alsatian wines should be pleased with 2007. The vintage, said, Etienne Hugel of Hugel & Fils, "ended up with one of the longest harvesting times in recent years [and] with overall longest hang time from blossoming to picking. Just what the doctor ordered. [It] should turn out to be a great classic vintage for us in Alsace." (WS)

Chianti

2006 Grade A

The weather in Tuscany tracked that of most of Italy: very hot in June and July, mild and damp in August, then hot again through September and October, with intermittent periods of rain. Yet despite the capricious weather conditions, winemakers throughout Tuscany are lauding the quality of the 2006 vintage. (WS)

Barbaresco

2004 4

Well balanced wines with ripe fruit. (D)
